Must live in Snohomish County. For children ages 3-18 who have been affected by domestic violence. Must live in a safe place with a non-abusive parent/guardian.

Must be living in a safe place where abuser is not present, and must reside in South King County. 2) Provides advocacy-based counseling for victims of domestic violence. Advocates meet with clients in a safe location to discuss safety planning, access resources, provide moral support and coordinate support groups. Safety is the primary concern for victims, their children, and the staff. Advocates do not meet clients in their homes, and do not meet with couples. Must reside in South King County.
